Our final event was to support our Newport MNA shipmates at their Service held on Sat. 20th November. Des Farnham was one of our members attending and Dave carried the Standard.



COLIN MANNINGS

I regret to inform you that our Shipmate Colin Crossed the Bar on Sunday 26th



September 2021 after a short illness. He was 97 and our oldest member. He joined us in October 1995 when living in Monmouth. He later moved to Margam Pk Village, Port Talbot before moving to Hoveton, Norfolk to be with his daughter following the death of his wife in 2016. He was at sea between August 1940 and September 1951, serving as a deck officer on 12 different ships his first ship being the S.S. Rio Azul. This trip ended badly when the Rio Azul was sunk at 1740 hrs on the 29th June 1941. Colin survived the sinking and details can be found in the Swinging the

BETTY CAMPBELL MBE

On the 29th September 2021 we were privileged to be invited to the unveiling and dedication of a permanent bronze monument to Betty Campbell at the front of the new HMRC Building, Central Square, Cardiff. She became Wales' first black head-teacher and championed her nations multicultural heritage throughout her life. Her father Simon Vickers Johnson served in the Merchant Navy during World War Two and was killed when his ship the S.S. Ocean Vanguard was torpedoed and sunk east of Trinidad on 13th September 1942. If you look closely at

the base of the monument you will see a model of the Ocean Vanguard in the hand of a little girl.

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION BARRY BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE THE GREAT WAR

On the 11th November 2021 I was invited to attend the unveiling of a Book of Remembrance of all the World War One casualties, including Mercantile Marine losses, from Barry. The project was initiated and funded by Barry Royal British Legion and complied by Dr. Jonathan Hicks. I provided him with information on the



NAUTILUS WELFARE FUND CASEWORKER PROJECT

On the 26th November 2021 we were invited by our Shipmate Alan Speight, Chairman of Newport MNA, to attend their general meeting at the Mission to Seafarers, Newport Docks. The purpose of the invite was to listen to a talk given by a Caseworker of the Nautilus Welfare Fund Caseworker Project. The Caseworker Project provides one-to-one advice and assistance on financial, health and other issues to retired seafarers and their dependants in their own homes. In addition to assisting with welfare benefits, caseworkers can also help access grants to help with essential household items and repairs. During a visit the caseworker can also check on the general wellbeing of the retired seafarers and their dependants and advise them on any other groups or activities which could help them enjoy a happy and healthy retirement.
